

Take 2 With PAUL POWER

A while ago a co-worker mentioned this film to me, "Dare To Be Different", and it turned out to be a fantastic 'rockumentary' (music documentary) that chronicled the rise-and demise of FM radio station WLIR in Long Island, New York. The fact that a radio station closed in the U.S. during any decade is not that rare or noteworthy; what is noteworthy is WLIR's incredible and legendary legacy. It was the first radio station in North America to play the music of U2, and music from the bands that defined the whole New Wave/ post punk movement in the 1980's: bands such as Duran Duran, Ultravox, Madonna, George Michael, Depeche Mode, Billy Idol, Frankie Goes To Hollywood, any many more (some appear here) with all of them looking at the radio station as a home away from home-and honest fans of their music long before the bandwagon rolled into town. The station originally followed a broadway tunes/ classical format from 1959 to 1970 and then switched formats to progressive rock (playing the music of the Doobie Brothers, Jackson Brown, Springsteen, etc) which ironiclly was despised by the punk rockers who paved the way for the New



Wave artists to come. Also documented here is the fact that Program Director Denis McNamara hated the term "new wave" (although he's creditd with actually coining the phrase) and preferred the term "new music", paving the way for the station to be the first to play hundreds of new songs from around the worldmuch to the chagrin of record labels who had a planned publicity timeline for the new stuff. In the end a 15 year "temporary license" snafu that got bigger as the station's reputation grew came into play and the idiots at the FCC (the American equivalent of our own branch of telecommunications idiotsthe CRTC) rang the bells of doom for the station which went off the air in December of 1987. A reformatted station with different call letters was the replacement, and much of the same staff remained. Things however were never the same-which is why this rockumentary is such a valuable chronicle of a magical time when "the spirit of radio" was new, fresh and exciting.

Volunteers Sought for CBRM Water Sampling Program

The CBRM Water Utility is seeking volunteers for lead and copper sampling in residential tap water. The program is for customers of the CBRM Water Utility and is not for those whose water source is a well. =

The Water Utility routinely monitors water quality within distribution systems. Last year, Nova Scotia Environment introduced additional sampling requirements for lead and copper within customers' homes.

This sampling program will be provided free of charge to a limited number of customers in each CBRM distribution system (Sydney, Glace Bay, Northside, New Waterford, Louisbourg, Floral Heights and Centreville). Participants will be registered on a first come first serve basis until the program goals are met. Customers can apply online at www.cbrm.ns.ca/water-utility

This water sampling will determine if lead and copper are present in customers' tap water and a results letter will be provided.

Although lead and copper can occur naturally in the environment, their main source in drinking water is through leaching of plumbing materials such as pipes, solder, faucets, and fittings. While copper is an acceptable material for use in plumbing, lead is no longer an acceptable building material. The National Plumbing Code allowed lead material in pipes until 1975, lead in solder until 1986, and lead in fittings or faucets until 2013.

In 2019, Health Canada lowered their maximum acceptable concentration for lead in drinking water from 0.010mg/L to 0.005mg/L and introduced a new maximum acceptable concentration for copper of 2 mg/L. They also changed the acceptable locations for sample collection. Samples for lead and copper must now be collected within homes and buildings where customers obtain water for drinking and cooking.

The municipality aims to conduct sampling at over 200 residences from among the municipality's water system customers.

GRASS FIRE SAFETY

A grass fire differs from other fires by its extensive size, the speed at which it can spread out form its original source, its potential to change direction unexpect-



edly and its ability to jump gaps such as roads, rivers and fire breaks. To prevent dangerous grass fires, assess your property to determine its risk. Tall trees, wild grass, shrubs and any other combustible materials can all contribute to spreading a fire. During drought or extended lengths of dry weather, this vegetation can become perfect fuel for a fire driven by strong winds. Some simple planning will greatly reduce the threat to your home, property and community.

- * Do not throw cigarette or cigar butts on the ground or out of a vehicle. Dispose of them properly and make sure the are completely extinguished.
- * Keep a 30 foot "safety zone" surrounding your home. This area should be clear of brush, with grass cut short. Store firewood and other combustible materials at least 30 feet away from any buildings. For homes that sit on a steep slope, the safety zone should be increased accordingly.
- * Keep your yard healthy, cut and watered it is a natural firebreak.
- *Clean up dead leaves and twigs from yard, roof and gutters. Cut tree limbs within 15 feet of the ground and remove dead branches that extend over the roof.
- * Do not park cars, trucks or recreational vehicles on dry grass or shrubs. Exhaust systems on vehicles can reach temperatures of more than 500° C. It only takes about 200° C to start a grass fire in the Summer.
- * Use an approved spark arrester on all internal combustion engine power equipment. This special muffler helps ensure that sparks generhis story is From "Tall tales & Udder Lies?ated by off road vehicles, chainsaws and other equipment don't start grass fires.
- * Parents should emphasize to their children the dangers of playing with fire. Children who have no idea how quickly flames can grow and spread, start many grass fires.
- * Homeowners who barbecque should maintain a 10 foot area free of brush and shrubbery around grills and propane tanks. Never leave a grill unattended.
- * Keep a shovel, buckets of water, fire extinguisher or garden hose on hand any time while burning outside.
- * If conducting a controlled burn, have a water hose close by and inform your local fire department before burning.
